SUBJECT: APPROVE TRANSFER REQUEST OF AGOURA HILLS 2015

COMMERCIAL SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLABLES PERMIT -

CROWN DISPOSAL TO RECOLOGY LOS ANGELES

On December 16, 2014, the City received communication from Crown Disposal Co., Inc., (Crown), to consent to a transfer of its current 2015 Commercial Solid Waste and Recyclable permit and associated encroachment permit, to Recology Los Angeles (Recology). Crown has been a permitted solid waste collector in the commercial sector for many years and annually secures a permit with the City. The City was advised that Crown has entered into an agreement with Recology to sell all, or substantially all, of its assets to Recology, who will continue its operations in the City. The Municipal Code states that a solid waste collector permit or a franchise issued shall not be transferred, delegated, sublet, subcontracted to, or assigned to another person without the approval of the City Council.

Upon receipt of the request, staff responded to Crown with inquiries on Recology's intentions with respect to its solid waste and recycling operations and was provided a response (attached). Review of the response from Recology reveals Recology will continue to operate in same capacity as Crown, and within 30 days from the conclusion of their acquisition, begin re-branding their vehicles with Recology markings.

Staff asked the City Attorney's Office to also review the request and concurred the actions being requested by Recology were similar to what was also occurring in neighboring and other municipal jurisdictions where Crown carries either permits or agreements. Their office saw no issue with this request. They did recommend Recology be provided a 2015 Commercial Solid Waste Permit application to be completed. This was provided to Recology. The City's solid waste consultant, Solid Waste Solutions Inc., reviewed several references provided by Recology and received positive comments about the company and its operations and administrative reporting to agencies. Their office has also received the completed 2015 commercial permit application and appropriate supporting documentation.

Recology's primary activity, as a solid waste collector, appears to have been in Northern California. They appear to be a well-established collector, with experience in solid

waste and recycling operations. Should the transfer request be approved by the City Council, staff will conclude its administrative work with Recology, update City website and appropriate public information lists, and release a Solid Waste Commercial and Recyclables Permit and a new encroachment permit to Recology. Recology would begin its operations starting January 29, 2015, and advise current Crown customers of the transition.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff respectfully recommends the City Council approve the transfer request of the Agoura Hills 2015 Commercial Solid Waste and Recyclables Permit – Crown Disposal to Recology Los Angeles.

To Mr. Louis Celaya,

Thank you for your inquiry dated December 29, 2014, regarding Crown Disposal Company's (Crown) request to transfer the City of Agoura Hill's (City) Commercial Solid Waste Permit 2015-01 and Encroachment Permit No. EP-13-133 (Permits) to Recology Los Angeles (Recology).

As previously noted, Recology has entered into an agreement to acquire substantially all of the assets of Crown (the Transaction). This letter is to provide the City with the information requested in your December 29th letter.

1. Does Recology plan to continue to operate in Agoura Hills as Crown Disposal Inc., or will it operate as Recology?

Recology plans to operate in the City of Agoura Hills under the "Recology Los Angeles" entity. Recology Los Angeles is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Recology Inc.

2. The City's understanding is that Recology Los Angeles is a subsidiary of Recology Inc. Is that understanding accurate?

Yes, Recology Los Angeles is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Recology Inc. Recology Inc. is parent to over 40 subsidiaries – including Recology Los Angeles. These subsidiaries partner with 119 communities in California, Washington, Oregon, and Nevada, helping over 710,000 residential and 95,000 commercial customers divert material from landfills. Recology Inc. operates:

- 11 transfer stations (six Company-owned)
- 10 Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs)
- Nine compost facilities

Following completion of the Transaction, Recology will operate the Sun Valley Material Recovery Facility (MRF) and the Lamont composting facility, which is the largest permitted compost facility in California.

In addition, Recology Inc. is the largest 100% employee-owned company in the solid waste collection and processing industries through an Employee Stock Ownership Plan (ESOP).

3. Is Recology planning to continue to operate in the commercial collection capacity as well as provision of temporary roll-off waste bins?

Yes, following completion of the Transaction, Recology plans to continue to provide the same commercial collection services available to Agoura Hills customers today, in addition to temporary roll-off services.

4. Will the collection vehicles continue operation as Crown or Recology? If Recology, what type of collection vehicles will be utilized, with what identifying markings?

Following completion of the Transaction,
Recology plans to continue utilizing the same
vehicles currently serving the City today. These
vehicles will be rebranded from Crown to
Recology Los Angeles.

The re-branding will initially entail placing decals and/or signs with the Recology Los Angeles logo on existing vehicles; this will be followed by repainting select vehicles with the Recology green, blue, and white color scheme (pictured).



5. If the intent is to operate as Recology, a revised Commercial Solid Waste and Recyclable application with all necessary Recology attachments, insurance, contact personnel, etc. will be required.

Recology has received the Commercial Solid Waste and Recyclable application from Deputy City Manager Louis Celaya, and has begun completing the application. Recology anticipates submitting the application before the January 14, 2015 City Council meeting.

6. Where will Recology's collected material be processed?

Recology will continue processing material collected in the City at the Sun Valley MRF located at 9189 DeGarmo Ave., Sun Valley, CA.

7. How does Recology plan to advise its current clients of this pending change?

Recology issues a Welcome Letter to all new customers. Once the Permit transfer is approved by the City, Recology will begin contacting customers regarding the change. Customer Service operations will remain local at the Sun Valley facility, and customer service telephone numbers are not expected to change. This will help minimize disruption to customers during the transition.

Recology partners closely with the municipalities it serves to meet diversion goals. This entails developing tailored outreach and education programs, coupled with the proper technical assistance

to help customers participate in diversion programs.

Recology maintains teams of Waste Zero Specialists, who work closely with individual accounts to help achieve higher diversion rates on the customer level. Through waste characterization studies, data-driven metrics, and education, Recology has helped some of the largest material generators achieve high diversion rates.

Alongside this letter, Recology has provided PDF samples of outreach and education material used by Recology in its existing service areas. The material is translated into languages that represent the community (such as Spanish or Mandarin).

8. Identify how Recology has remedied their northern California issues with tonnage reporting.

Recology understands that this question in is reference to a lawsuit brought by Brian McVeigh against Recology.

Recology understands that higher diversion rates are important to the City of Agoura Hills, and would like to provide the following update regarding the case:

- The Plaintiff alleged that Recology submitted false claims to the State of California regarding CRV reimbursements and to the City and County of San Francisco regarding a Diversion Incentive Account.
- On June 17, 2014, a jury rendered a verdict in favor of Recology on all 154 claims regarding CRV reimbursements and on four out of five claims regarding the Diversion Incentive Account.
- On October 21, 2014, the judge set aside the jury verdict on the one claim that the jury did
 not find for Recology and granted a new trial on that claim on the grounds that there was
 insufficient evidence to support the jury verdict.

Recology has worked closely with the municipalities it serves, including the City and County of San Francisco, to meet reporting requirements and validate the accuracy of Recology's diversion reporting. This includes updated reporting systems, improved reporting protocols, and streamlined reporting efforts with regulatory agencies.

9. Provide a list of municipalities currently or formerly serviced by Recology Los Angeles, including years in service and contact references.

Recology Los Angeles does not currently service any municipalities. Once the Transaction closes, Recology Los Angeles anticipates serving municipalities in Southern California that include Beverly Hills, Calabasas, Pasadena, Thousand Oaks, Santa Paula, and Santa Clarita.

Therefore, Recology is providing references from a number of municipalities serviced by its operating companies in Northern California and Washington.
