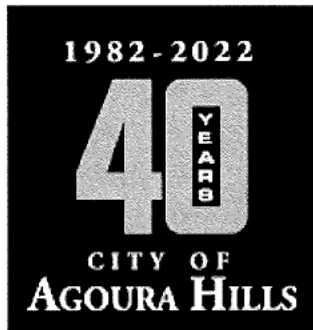

RE: Introduction of an ordinance to amend the 2022 California Green Building Standards Code

Dear Mayor and City Council,

I am in support of the staff recommendation to introduce Ordinance No. 23-466 to establish the City of Agoura Hills Reach Code and adopt all-electric building requirements. Is it possible to include multi-family residential building projects in this proposal subject to further review prior to the final adoption of this ordinance? Ideally, they would be included in this ordinance. There may be some new cost effective proposals available that are geared to multi family units relating to community solar and other relevant strategies.

Approval of the introduction of this ordinance is consistent with your past adoption of the City's Climate Action and Adaptation Plan(CAAP) and the intent and goals of both state and federal policies. In addition, accelerating the investment in clean renewable energy and storage is also a priority as a member of the So Cal Clean Power Authority. The California Energy Commission will be leading new statewide efforts in 2023 to implement EV charging infrastructure. Your report for the Jan 11th meeting points out, two of the largest portion of the City's emissions is from transportation followed by natural gas use in buildings.

Thank you to the Council and staff for their continued interest and support towards becoming a more sustainable community.
