Walkways, driveways, yard sculpture, and landscaping should mimic the native designs of mother nature. Use of native plants will protect adjacent parkland. Drought-tolerant landscaping and an efficient water system will help conserve natural resources. Outdoor light fixtures should be low wattage with shielded bulbs. Most residents choose to use their outdoor lights only when necessary, minimizing light pollution and allowing a darker, stargier sky for all.

Horse and livestock keeping is welcomed and encouraged, and permitted under the City's Municipal Code and General Plan. Old Agoura's Equestrian Overlay District mandates the preservation of horse keeping areas on residential lots throughout Old Agoura as well as street frontage easements for future bridle path construction.

Old Agoura's rural setting and natural surroundings bring a special sense of openness and tranquility to the area, something that is enjoyed by all our citizens. The City of Agoura Hills is committed to preserving and maintaining the unique characteristics of its oldest neighborhood.
