Ceanothus (California Lilac - smells romantic in the spring), cream, white and blue • Sages (black, purple, white, the scent of summer morning)

Manzanita (sweet little berries) • Lemonade Berry (sweet little berries, again) • Rosa Californica (smells like happiness)

Mugwort (a Native antidote for poison oak) • Deerweed (dainty little yellow flowers) • Dudleya (beautiful + tough succulent)

Buckwheat • Fuchsia • Sticky Monkeyflower • Native Grasses • Native Flowers • Wildflower Seeds for spring
